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The Church Calendar

This *Saints Calendar and Daily Planner—2025* includes both the *New* or *Novus Ordo* Sundays and feast days, and the *Traditional* Sundays and feast days (as of 1962). These latter are observed when the Traditional Latin Mass is offered. The *Novus Ordo* Sundays and feast days, which date from 1970 or later whenever they differ from the *Traditional* ones, are designated: (*New*). The *Traditional* Sundays and feast days, most of which go back centuries, are designated: (*Trad.*). Also included here are many feast days which no longer appear on either the *New* or the *Traditional* calendar (as of 1962)—such as the feasts of St. Philomena, St. Dismas (the Good Thief), St. Tarcisius, St. Gemma Galgani, and St. Dominic Savio; these *Historical* feasts are designated: (*Hist.*). It should be noted that there was some moving around of feast days even before the New Calendar was introduced in 1970. For example, St. Catherine of Sweden is shown on March 22 in a 1931 edition of Butler's *Lives of the Saints* but on March 24 in a 1956 edition of the same work.

In this calendar, the date in parentheses after the name of a saint is the year of the saint's death.

Fast and Abstinence

The Church's current regulations in the U.S. require fasting and abstinence from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday; abstinence from meat on the Fridays of Lent; and abstinence from meat or some other penitential or charitable work on every non-Lenten Friday of the year, unless the Friday falls on a solemnity. "On the Fridays outside of Lent, the U.S. bishops conference obtained the permission of the Holy See for Catholics in the U.S. to substitute a penitential, or even a charitable, practice of their own choosing. They must do some penitential/charitable practice on these Fridays. For most people, the easiest practice to consistently fulfill will be the traditional one, to abstain from meat. . . . During Lent, abstinence from meat on Fridays is obligatory in the United States as elsewhere" (www.ewtn.com/faith/lent/fasting.aspx). Abstinence is binding from age 14 (i.e., beginning the day after one's 14th birthday); fasting is binding from age 18 (i.e., beginning the day after one's 18th birthday) until age 59 (i.e., until the end of the day of one's 59th birthday).

According to the *Modern Catholic Dictionary*, by Fr. John A. Hardon, S.J. (Imprimatur 1979): "The abolition of Friday abstinence is a common misapprehension. Friday abstinence was not abolished; rather, the faithful [in the U.S.A.] now have a choice either to abstain from meat or perform some other kind of penance [or even to perform some charitable work] on Fridays. According to the Church's law, the 'substantial observance' of Fridays as days of penance, whether by abstinence or in other ways, 'is a grave obligation' (Pope Paul VI, *Paenitemini*, 1966, Norm II, 2)."

What Is Fasting?




Fasting according to the Church's norms means eating only one full meal per day. Two smaller meals or snacks may also be eaten, sufficient to maintain one's strength, but together they should not equal the one full meal. No food may be taken between meals; but liquids, including milk and juice, may be taken between meals. Expectant mothers and the sick are not bound to fast. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. In the current regulations, fasting is always accompanied by abstinence from meat. That is, both of the obligatory fasting days (Ash Wednesday and Good Friday) are also days of abstinence from meat. The Bishops of the U.S. have stated that "self-imposed

observance of fasting on all weekdays of Lent is strongly recommended" (NCCB statement, November 18, 1966). Fasting on Holy Saturday is specifically recommended by the Church.


What Is Abstinence?

Abstinence from meat means that no meat (the flesh and organs of mammals and fowl), meat gravy, or meat soup may be taken.

Fish Symbols

In this calendar, the dark fish  indicates days of obligatory abstinence from meat; the shaded fish  indicates days of obligatory abstinence from meat or substitution of some other sacrifice (see explanation above); the unshaded fish  indicates days of recommended (formerly obligatory) abstinence from meat.

Former (Traditional) Penitential Observances

This calendar also marks the "Ember Days," that is, the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday of four weeks during the year. Ember Fridays were formerly days of fast and abstinence; Ember Wednesdays and Saturdays were formerly days of fast and partial abstinence (meat permitted only at the main meal). Days on which fasting and partial abstinence were formerly required are indicated by an unshaded half-fish . The Ember Days, of ancient origin, were days of fasting for the special sanctification of the four seasons and for obtaining God's blessing on the clergy. They occur during the third week of Advent, the first (full) week of Lent, the week after Pentecost, and the third (full) week in September.

Fasting and partial abstinence were formerly required also on the weekdays of Lent (Monday through Saturday, with full abstinence on Friday) and on the vigil of (day before) Pentecost. Holy Saturday and the vigils of the Immaculate Conception and of Christmas (December 24 or 23; a choice was permitted) were formerly days of fasting and of complete abstinence from meat (unless the vigil fell on a Sunday).

It is praiseworthy to continue the former (traditional) penitential observances, even though they are no longer obligatory. Penance serves to rectify our self-centeredness, to make up for sins (our own and those of others), to strengthen our wills, and to guide us in the footsteps of our Savior. It can be a very pure form of love for God, and can be offered up for the conversion of sinners and the relief of the souls in purgatory.

NOTES

Abstinence from meat was formerly (traditionally) binding from age 7; parents who maintain this discipline in their families are to be highly commended. Moreover, the new Code of Canon Law (1983) states that "pastors and parents are to see to it that minors who are not bound by the law of fast and abstinence are educated in an authentic sense of penance" (Canon 1252).

Fasting was formerly (traditionally) binding from age 21.

INCLUSION OF SAINTS


In keeping with its purpose as an aid to devotion rather than an official liturgical Ordo, this daily planner includes even those saints who are not commemorated in the liturgy (whether *Novus Ordo* or Traditional) in the current year. Such saints are principally those whose days fall in Lent or on Sunday.

St. Hildegard of Bingen (1098–1179) September 17 (*New/*
Virgin, Abbess, Doctor of the Church *some places; Hist.*)



St. Hildegard was a German nun popularly known for her ability to foretell the future, her visions, and her letters of rebuke or warning to many, including popes. She is also now known for the beautiful music that she composed. Born in Böckelheim, from the time she was eight, she lived in the care of Bl. Jutta, a hermit. Before Hildegard was 15, Jutta had formed a community which followed the rule of St. Benedict. Hildegard joined this community and became prioress upon Jutta's death in 1136. From an early age, Hildegard was favored with visions. After the archbishop of Mainz and theologians reviewed them and discerned their divine origin, Hildegard was given a secretary to whom she dictated her visions. These visions received the approbation of a bishop appointed by the pope. Hildegard

was consulted by huge numbers of persons, including popes and emperors. Yet, opinion was divided regarding her and her visions. Hildegard was never formally canonized, though she is listed in the Roman Martyrology as a saint. She is known as the "Sibyl of the Rhine." St. Hildegard was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Benedict XVI in 2012.
